AMY SANSONE

Department of Exceptional Learners
Crown Point High School, Crown Point, IN

Amy Sansone says: "As a special education teacher, I know that no kid wants to feel different. Everyone wants to be included and respected. It's my belief that I not only need to teach, but also cheerlead them to believe they are worthy of accomplishing their goals. As teachers we need to help our students find their passion, the fire burning in their belly. We need to give them opportunities to succeed and remind them of their successes, so that they know they can do it again. The bottom line is I do what I do because I love to work with kids."

"Mrs. Sansone is so warm and made freshman year so much better for my son. He felt comfortable with her right away. He also has a hard time making friends, but she helped him through so many issues and helped to boost his self-esteem. She just made him feel so "normal". She helps some students deal with emotional issues and had her hands full with my son. She was his 'magic person' and calmed him down. She works well with so many issues. I don't think I have the best words to explain her, she is just the best teacher my son has ever had!"

CYNTHIA MCCREARY, M.S. ED.

Special Education Teacher
South Anna Elementary School, Hanover, VA

Cynthia McCreary says: *"My philosophy in educating children with special needs is that one must listen with their heart. Each child will teach you how they learn best. You must be keenly aware of individual characteristics of the child, not the disability. Students with special needs will guide your instructional strategies. Every aspect of their character, personality and learning style will speak volumes, even if they never utter a word."*

"Ms. McCreary strongly demonstrates teaching excellence with students with intellectual disability, significantly involves parents and others from the community in the educational process, individualizes the curriculum to meet student needs, and utilizes innovative methods in addressing student needs. She is a leader in the TEACCH methodology administered in the classroom and serves as a mentor to other SPED teachers on the methodology. She approaches education in a holistic sense by addressing all senses of her students. She even instituted a sensory area in the classroom... She encourages open communication and frequent status updates by providing daily progress notes on the general progress of the day, intermittent emails/texts of significant events accompanied by pictures, weekly raw data of the status of the student's IEP goals, email each Sunday evening to all parents with the schedule for the week, and data in graph format for interim and report cards. She is involved with her students in both the classroom as well as in their home environment (e.g., regularly attends students' birthday party, even on weekends, to help with transitions)." – Submitted by: Allison Thurman, mother of Alex Thurman, student in Ms. McCreary's class

Chris is always the consummate professional, utilizing her full range of skills and experience to address the individual needs of each student. Chris partners with students, teachers and parents to set realistic goals and provide education at each step of treatment to ensure that youngsters achieve the maximum benefit. Her commitment to inclusion has led her to develop several innovative opportunities for our students. Through her initiative, our school developed an adapted bicycling program that enables students with all disabilities to ride a bike for recreation and exercise. To help our faculty and educators in other schools implement this program, she wrote and produced an instructional interactive iBook. Elaine Phillips says: *"The reason I started teaching, was that in college I met friends who were blind and I was so impressed with them as people that I wanted to be a part of educating students who were blind and visually impaired to help them achieve independence commensurate with their capabilities. After almost 40 years in public school and at Perkins School for the Blind, the goal of teaching students to be as independent as possible is still just as important to me. Recently I did extra work with two students to help them prepare a portfolio of their work to fulfill the requirements for state mandated testing in math, and they were able to receive high school diplomas, another key to independence."*



"Teachers who come to Perkins School for the Blind are often 'Miracle Workers' giving their students what they need to optimize their abilities and truly do all that is possible. Elaine Phillips is one such teacher — a veteran with nearly 40 years of teaching experience, she has touched the lives of many students. She has taught in the Perkins Secondary Program full-time since 2009. While her efforts always have a positive impact, last year was special for two girls who Elaine worked closely with in developing their MCAS portfolios. Elaine worked tirelessly to support these young women, including in off hours and before her regular classes began each morning, and eventually DESE determined that they had passed. Because of Elaine's belief in them, the students' efforts paid off and they received their high school diplomas... Elaine is an amazing teacher who works with students with a variety of visual, behavioral, physical and intellectual abilities.
